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# Changing Landscape of Higher Education


- The fundamental values of the Web freedom, openness, transparency, collaboration, flexibility, and meritocracy – have challenged many tradition-bound principles and practices in education. An example is open educational resources.
- The paradigm shift toward Web-centric teaching and learning has led to new educational structures that require new institutional processes, new support services, as well as new skills and pedagogy. Some examples are:
  - democratization of information and knowledge
  - globalization and internationalization of education
  - ownership vs. access
  - individual vs. collaborative
  - campus vs. "above campus" or network ("cloud campus")





# What is "OER"?

Open Educational Resources are educational materials that are *freely* and *openly* available for anyone to use and under some *licenses* to:



# Why OER?

- Improves access to learning opportunities
  - Save time, cut costs
  - Alternative to the rising cost of education
  - Contributions to a pool of learning resources can circumvent barriers to access and improve education as a social good
- New way of teaching and learning that is more collaborative and participatory
  - Move from content creation to content co-creation
  - Become part of a growing community
- Materials can be adapted and localized to fit the specific audience need

#### What is "OER"?

"OER" stands for "open educational resources." OER are educational tools that academia can access for free online in order to further their learning (like textbooks or classes).

## HOW IT WORKS

#### Rights management and attribution:

Copyrights protect published and unpublished tangible work. Copyrights let the author control what kind of acknowledgement is needed, how the work is reproduced and rights to distribution.

Copyright: A copyright is the exclusive right of ownership granted to the author or creator of a work. Copyright protection, granted by a country's law, lasts a fixed amount of time, and gives the author complete protection from exploitation of the work. Some use of the work is permissible, like fair use, most other use requires permission.

Public domain: If a work is no longer protected by copyright under law, or the author forfeits all rights, it may become available to the public free for use without permission.

#### Creative Commons licensing: These

copyright licenses are an alternative type of copyright that allows the author or creator to maintain the copyright to a work while granting users certain rights regarding remixing reproduction and distribution. Authors choose what right they wish to reserve or relinguish.

Creative Commons licensing gives everyone the opportunity t access, build and share knowledge free of cost. For more information go to: https://creativecommons.org.






